

Manners and Responsibilities Associated with Driving



1 Give-and-Take and Consideration for Others

When you are driving you will occasionally see pedestrians who wish to cross the street but are unable to, or other drivers who wish to enter the flow of traffic from a side street but cannot. At times like this it is important to consider more than just the rules and regulations of the road. You must also make an effort to see things from the other person's point of view and apply the principle of give-and-take.

The principles of **give-and-take and consideration for others** are important when driving; they make the driving experience more pleasant for everyone.

2 Taking Care Not to Inconvenience Others

When driving a car you must not think only of your own convenience. It is important also to consider other drivers, pedestrians, and those living alongside the road on which you are driving. You must avoid making excess noise or parking in places that will inconvenience others.

Furthermore, actions like throwing rubbish (such as empty drink cans or cigarette butts) or placing other unwanted items onto the road are not only inconsiderate of others, but can also cause accidents.




Leaving your engine idling¹ can annoy others.

This term refers to the situation in which the vehicle is stopped but the engine is running at low speed (i.e., the accelerator pedal is not depressed).





Driving with Consideration for the Global Environment...

Carbon dioxide and other components of automobile emissions are known to increase global warming resulting in more frequent abnormal weather, an increase in natural disasters, and serious damage to agricultural crops. To help prevent adding to global warming drivers can take steps such as avoiding unnecessary engine idling and excessively rapid acceleration.

4. Use Right Part of Road




Indicate that it is permissible, on a road with a steep incline, to pass the center line and enter the right part when executing a turn.

2. Diagonal Crossing Permitted


Indicate that pedestrians and remote control small-sized vehicles may cross the intersection diagonally.



(2) Permitted Throughout the Day



5. Stop Line



Indicates the position where vehicles must come to a stop.

Indicate the positions where two- and three- or four-wheeled vehicles must come to a stop.


3. Bicycle Crossing Lane



Indicate a bicycle crossing lane.

7. Lane Direction



Indicate the directions in which traffic in each lane must proceed from the intersection.

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
